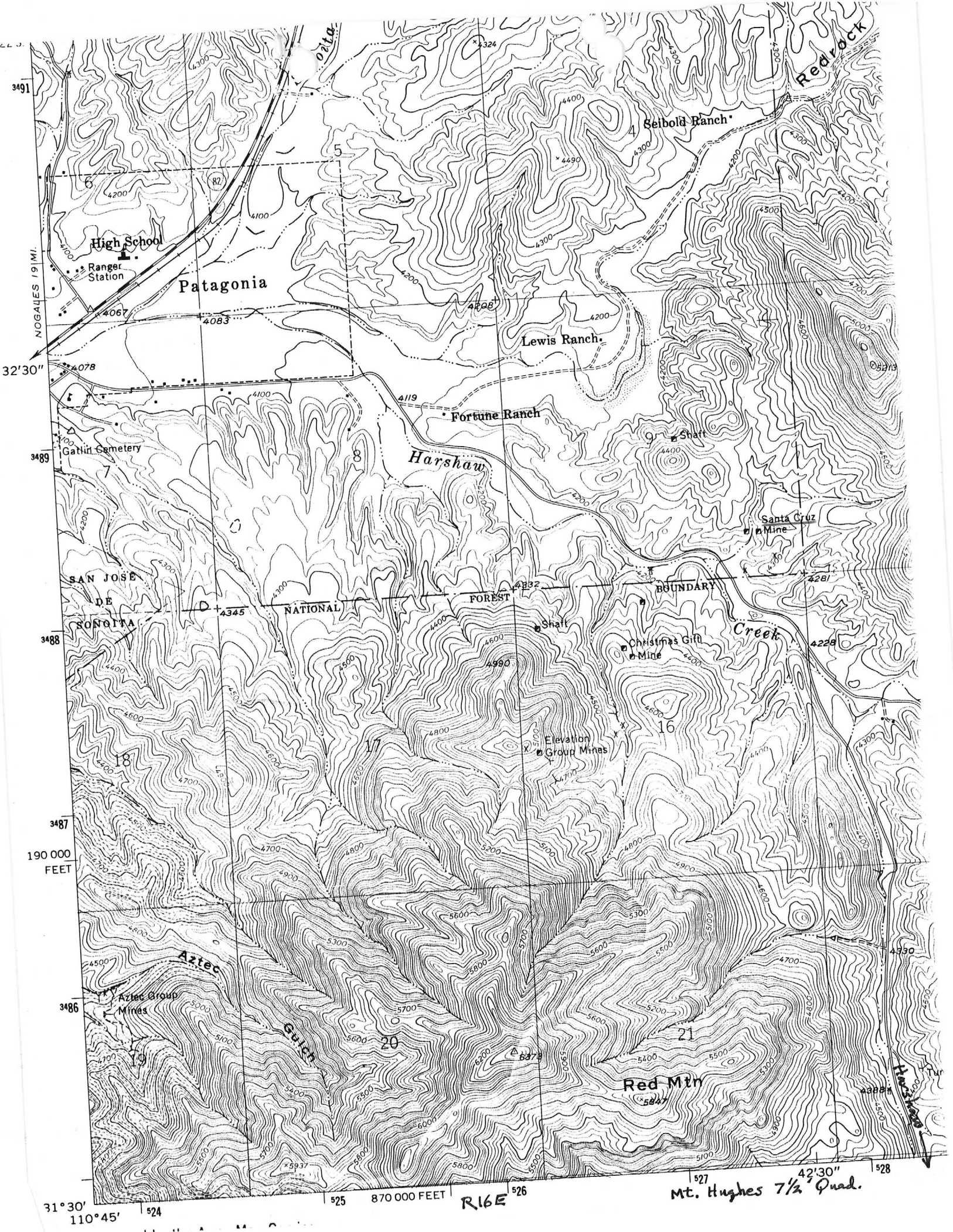

MEMORANDUM

July 21, 1943

To: Bill Broadgate
From: J. S. Coupal
Subject: G. J. Bible Loan Application

I turned your file on this subject, and your correspondence with J. D. McClintock, over to Charlie for his attention. Your correspondence is being returned herewith.

I have seen Charlie's reply to you of July 19th on this subject. I have also talked with Bill Gohring about the Bible application and from him received the following information.

The RFC office stated definitely they did not recommend to Bible that he unwater the shaft. At the time Bible notified them that the shaft was unwatered, they were not in a position to send an engineer to the property immediately, as requested. As soon as an engineer did get to the district he contacted Mr. Bible and Bible stated to him that he felt as though he did not care to go ahead with the loan application as he was too old and was disgusted with the whole situation. So much for Gohring's end.

I looked at the workings mentioned sometime about a year and a half ago. I went in the bottom of the shaft and found little or no values, but a showing that was something worthwhile considering as a development project for more or less wildcat mining. Later on, Bible gave a lease to W. C. Herrick who went ahead and sunk a shaft a little deeper. The showing did not justify his going ahead. After they quit, Bible evidently stopped work and then made an application for an accessibility loan. These accessibility loans do not call for an examination by a field engineer. The loan was processed through this office, and a "no loan" recommendation made, which was confirmed by Washington. Bible is impossible to do business with, and has a misconception of the whole situation. I have discussed the work in the field many times with Bible, and he cannot understand why government funds are not available for him to go ahead, irrespective of the regulations relating to mining or what the engineers think. Confidentially and personally to you, when McClintock makes the remark, "a report made by me is forthwith denied" it may be that Mr. McClintock has too optimistic a few on some of the mining properties he has examined.

The application by Bible was received on April 15, 1943 and a report was made April 25, 1943. It bears the docket no. Phx. C-187. I believe the property warrants exploration work but from my observations of the ore showing in the bottom of the winze, I would say that it could in no sense be considered development work.

I have just located a letter from Herrick dated June 26, where he states he has written for a Class "B" Mine Loan form. At the time he was sinking a shaft by windlass and was down about 50 feet. He stated that a recent assay shows 8.6% and 5.4% in copper, with 2.4 to .82 oz. silver and trace of gold. Also a statement that "I believe we are soon coming into a substantial width of commercial ore." I can find no evidence that the application for a "B" loan was made at that time. In my talks with Herrick he stated that he did not feel the showing was worth while continuing to spend his money on.

Dear Bill:

Referring to your correspondence with McClintock - I am answering part of it and then turning it back to Sam for further information regarding the Bible situation.

It wants to be made clear that the Department of Mineral Resources has nothing whatsoever to do with any mine loans except accessibility loans. We do not even know when other loan applications are made or what is done with them as we get the information from indirect sources. The only thing our engineers do is to assist people in making out their loan applications.

Bible evidently had a development loan application with which we had nothing to do. It is strange, however, that it never even got a Docket number because every loan gets that. I will have Sam check into it at the Phoenix office of RFC but I believe that you will find Bible made an insufficient application and they wrote back asking him to augment and present it properly and he did not do so. This is my guess.

It is perfectly ridiculous that Ballam has any opposition to mine loans as we have dozens of instances where he has helped and there probably are more loans working in his section than in any other section of the state. He does, however, caution applicants who think that the money is just being handed out and he does discourage them from putting in applications where he knows positively there is not a chance for them to get what they ask for.

There is a lot of trouble with Rasor who, it is claimed, turns down properties without adequate examination and in a number of cases has been faced with making an examination of properties for RFC on which his opinion has been recorded previously and therefore he could not change his report. He simply had to turn them down again regardless of the change in circumstances. We have more complaint on Rasor than on all the rest of Bill Gehring's engineers put together and most of it seems well justified.

Regarding the loan application of Brann - this application was made on February 1, 1943. The examination, however, was not made until early in March as the records show that the field report was received in Washington on March 25, 1943. When we received a report of the status of loans in May, this particular one was still pending but it was all through with here and was merely being held up in Washington. I believe that from this information you can trace it without a Docket number. The reason it was slow was that the application was made direct to Washington instead of Phoenix.

I believe Sam knows considerable about the Bible case and will write you further. Possibly he can get from Gehring's office the history of what really happened.

It should be made clear to McClintock and others that there is no complicated set-up here in Arizona on mine loans, the only difference from other states being that we have a field force to help the small mine operators make out their applications. McClintock's observations in the second paragraph of his July 8 letter that "the result is that small operators are considerably handicapped in their efforts" is not the fact in that Arizona has had more loans and more money by a long shot than any other state.

(B) W. C. Herrick, above referred to, was the last operator of the Silver Eagle property. It is believed he made application for an RFC Development Loan in July or August 1942. The files should be searched for such application before reaching a decision on this application.

(C) The greatest asset accruing this property is the recommendation of J. D. McClintock, and his apparent high regard of the property must be given weight. The calculations attached to the McClintock report are, however, based upon an assumed tonnage of ore having an assumed value equivalent to that previously sorted and shipped in small amounts. The Herrick letters indicate that there is no commercial amount of such ore in evidence in the present workings.

(D) In combining the fragments of information in an interpretable form it would appear that there is an area worthy of exploration below the present workings but that at the present horizon there is no exposure of continuity or regularity. As an exploration project this application cannot qualify for RFC financing.

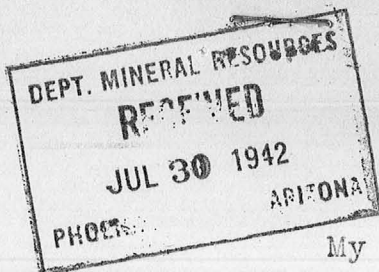
Mr. Ballam has council meetings on the 12th at Nogales and on the 14th at Patagonia, so he will have chance to see you at that time.

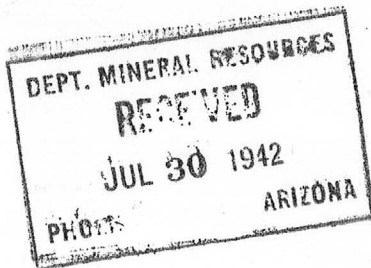

Dear Bible:

Please pardon the delay in answering your letter of June 30th. I discussed the possibility of your obtaining an R.F.C. loan for the Silver Eagle and I am enclosing Circular No. 14, which is descriptive of the type of loans available; also enclosed are R.F.C. application forms which are self-explanatory.

The proper procedure is to fill out one set of forms and give them to Bill Gohring in Phoenix, who is the examining engineer for the R.F.C. in Arizona. I think you are acquainted with him. Incidentally, the Small Mine Operators Association will have a hand in approving these small loans. I suggest that you get in touch with Mr. Coupal and ask him to expedite approval for you. You might also suggest to Mr. Gohring that if your application is approved by him and forwarded to Washington, that he mark it for the attention of Mr. R. H. Nelson. Upon receipt of the application by Mr. Nelson, I will be advised and will discuss it with him then.

I suggest you file application for a preliminary development loan on form No. L-332 rather than for a straight development loan on form L-254.

I expect to be in Tucson for a few days next week. I do not believe I will get a chance to get to Patagonia, but would like to see you if you find it convenient to get to Tucson.

Dear Mr. Herrick:

Thank you for your letter of June 26 and I would suggest that with the showing you now have you proceed immediately with the application for the RFC Class B (development mine loan).

The procedure on this is to fill out the application in complete detail, outline and estimate the proposed work and the cost of it, and when completed, mail the application to Washington, D. C. When this application is approved the Washington office will instruct the RFC examining engineer at Phoenix to examine your property and make his report direct to Washington. Washington then decides on whether or not to make the loan.

The engineers from the Department of Mineral Resources are not called in on any of this work as it is entirely the work of the RFC Mine Loan Division. The next time Mr. George A. Ballam is in your district I believe he will assist in making your loan application.

There is one thing I wish to impress upon you regarding the loans. If one is accurate, careful and gives all of the information available on the application in a concise manner, it is apt to be more favorably received and get quicker action than if the application is hastily and improperly drawn.

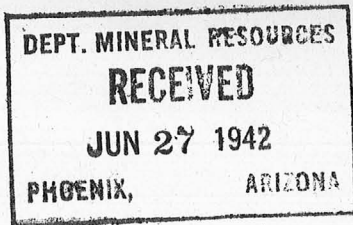

Attention Mr. Earl F. Hastings:-

Replying to your favor of the 19th inst. inquiring as to my knowledge of the Silver Eagle property which is owned by Mr. Bible. The property comprises two claims.

At a point ^{on} of the Silver Eagle there is an open cut, partly tunnel approx. 60 feet in with little depth under "grass roots". There is a shaft about 40 feet deep inside the cut and at the point of the tunnel. This shaft makes considerable water and has no definite walls. Above the collar there shows a width of several feet of oxidized material carrying a slight amount of copper in portions of it. Appears to be a large surface vein running westerly and Easterly. In the shaft we encountered a few pieces of ore showing well in peacock copper and heavy in iron. There is a predominate amount of white iron thru the entire formation in the shaft and a little yellow iron. An assay we took gave approx 3 % copper. However there is no ore of any consequence in the shaft. If there is an ore body there it lies at an undetermined depth below any present workings. There are some reasons that would justify diamond drill exploration.

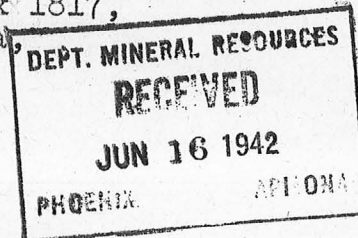

Dear Sir;- I have under lease and option four mining claims known as the Silver Eagle No.1 and Silver Eagle No.2 owned by G.J.Bible and the Santa Cruz No.1 and Santa Cruz No.2 owned by M.M.Saylor all of which are adjacent to each other. My contract call for 10 % net royalty to apply on the total purchase price of \$10,000.00 within five years from the month of March 1942. May 1942.

The vein matter near the top is Oxodized copper ore with a little silver, and is about 9 feet wide. A drift some 60 feet has been run along this Oxodized showing where some shipping values were taken out.

At a debth of approx 25 feet the vein changes into a primary sulphide carrying iron pyrites and some copper and silver. We have sunk down to about 40 feet on the Silver Eagle No.1 below the drift that I speak of and have some high grade copper, with some silver and perhaps zinc on the hanging wall side. At that debth the vein matter is fully ten feet wide and looks like we are on top of a large deposit rather than in just a vein.

The general vein matter is hardening altho we are in considerable talc, loose quartz, some lime and even manganese in the muck. Some water comes in the vein which we are easily handling. I am working three men and doing some timbering. I have been advised by two engineers that the surface Geology together with the present underground showing indicates the certainty of a valuable property and that it positively warrants development..

This property is $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles by good road from the loading station at Patagonia. (a big factor in hauling costs). I am told that considerable high grade copper silver ore was shipped from the property many years ago, and that the present Silver Eagle No.1 claim was sold ~~xxx~~ once for \$35,000.00 cash..

I wish to continue sinking to at least 100 feet and then cross cut to determine the extent of the vein. I believe we will encounter shipping ore as we do this and then later to follow what ever policy that is in the best interest of the property. I have available a hoist, cable, engine, pumping unit, car, track, transportation, some tools and adequate camping facilities.

Mr.Bible says you have been on this property and have some knowledge of it, and has advised me to get in touch with you. I believe a loan of \$5000.00 properly expended will enable me to put this property on production or ready for production. There are reason to believe it is the same strike as the Three R property. obtaining

The owners will co-operate in/obtaining the loan, and I desire your assistance to procure a \$5000.00 loan as soon as possible. Please advise me at your earliest convenience.
